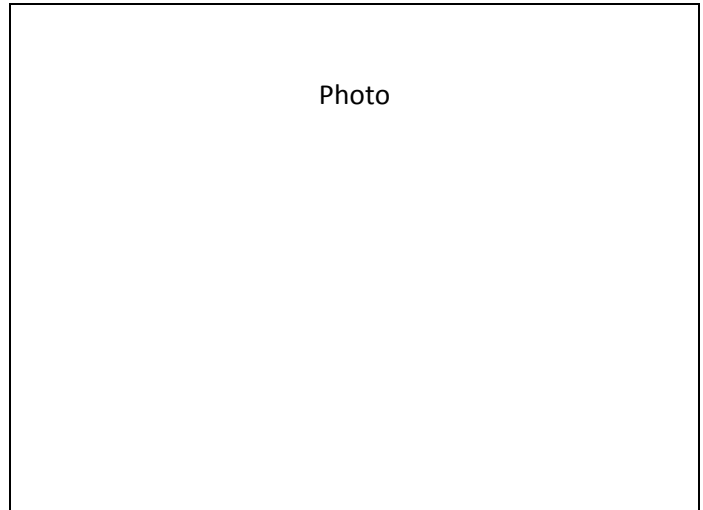

Equine Evacuation Plan

- Prioritize Which Animals will be evacuating ahead of the Emergency Event.
- Train your horse to Load and Unload from a trailer
- Make sure you have access to an adequate horse trailer for evacuating your horses
- Plan your Destination
- Plan/Map an Evacuation Route – Have at least 1 alternative route
- Evacuate at least 3 days ahead of any know Emergency Event
- Leave Contact information at the Barn and with Neighbors
- Bring Provisions for Animals (Food, Water, Medication)
- Bring Provisions for Humans (Food, Water, Medication)
- Take copy of Medical History, Vaccination and Coggins test
- Check Fuel levels and have an emergency supply of Cash

Shelter-In-Place Plan

- Identify Your Horse in 2 Ways

Permanent : Microchip, Tattoo

Temporary: Spray Paint, Paint stick

(Write Owner's Name/Number)

- Have Enough Hay for 5- 7 Days, Elevated or in plastic
- First Aid Kit stocked
- Flashlight, Hand Radio and Batteries
- Follow Local Advisories for Indoor or Outdoor Sheltering
- Contact your County Emergency Operations Center with your status
